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MEASURING TEACHERS' ATTENTIONAL DISTRIBUTION & PROFESSIONAL VISION

IN EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION USING MOBILE EYE TRACKING

Research context: SBO-FWO Tacos

Teacher language input and teacher-child interactions are critical in language development (Grifenhagen & Dickinson, 2023), particularly for low SES students (Suskind et al., 2018). Because interactions between children and peers are low frequent (Peleman et al., 2019). And there are language input disparities in the home environment (Fernald et al., 2013).

This PhD-research: "How do early childhood teachers distribute their attention during language learning activities in the classroom and how do they reflect upon this?"

Eye contact is important in language interaction between teacher and child (Hataaja et al., 2021) .

But: Language development opportunities are not devided equally over all children (Black, 2004; Peleman et al., 2019).


This research project will develop and measure the language stimulating competences of early childhood teachers. The Blömeke-model will be used to investigate intervention effects. This model views competencies along a contrinuum from dispositions that unfluence our perception and interpretation of classroom situations, which in turn leads to performance in the classroom (Blömeke et al., 2015).

- Eye gaze is not distributed equally (İnan-Kaya & Rubie-Davies, 2022; Smidekova et al., 2020). But it is unknown what influences the aiming of attention.
- Mobile eye tracking is a new, advanced way of looking into professional vision. It has not been done with early childhood teachers in this context.
- Eye tracking has been used in previous research to measure implicit teacher bias, including in early childhood settings (Gilliam et al., 2016; İnan-Kaya & Rubie-Davies, 2022).

First results

- Teachers' attention is not distrubuted evenly
- Children's speaking confidence is the most important factor in succeeding to attract teacher attention
- Teachers' beliefs and attitudes are important in explaining teacher attention


Which children are being overlooked?
